July Program

Architectural woodcarving was the subject of Steve Brandt's presentation at our July meeting and he brought several examples of various woods, styles, and uses to illustrate his talk. Examples ranged from fairly simple incise work



to ball and claw furniture legs, to pierced patterns in oak or other hardwoods, to actual relief carvings of various subjects. He explained selected carvings are actually applied works where they are glued or otherwise mounted on other surfaces. He explained how additional examples can serve as corbels, shelves, sconces

for lighting, and items that can simple be used in and everyday household.

For those who are not that familiar with Steve's work it should be noted that he has used his skills to restore many old and



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antique clocks that have been broken or have lost parts over the years. He began his carving career as a chip carver and can boast of many awards in that field. His chip carved fireplace screen toke home *Runner Up to Best of Show* at one of our shows, the highest award that chip carving has ever placed.

Each had their own project and received some truly expert advice on how to proceed. **James Hooper** started with a very large block of Butternut to carve a version of Clint Eastwood from one of his westerns. James must have put twenty pounds of chips on the floor but he managed to find an excellent carving in the end.





Ken Farrell learned fast that if one tries to keep up with Janet Cordell, big tools are a necessity. He very quickly picked up a 25 mm. #11 to do the finer work. His first





project was a female bust but he managed to begin a second that is a full figure girl.



Clyde Fosdyke's project was a high relief carving of his grandchildren. He special ordered the block of wood for this 13 inches square and two inches thick. Clyde, also, learned to use large tools from the very beginning of the carving.

Pete Zachry chose to carve Adina's latest female figure in a toga style wrap. He managed to come along fairly well until he cut off her hand. This will take some repair, but much was learned in the process.
